Gratitude

At our March meeting the Chapter Rose Croix conducts the Ceremony of Remembrance and Renewal. And in this issue of the Bulletin we list the names of those Brethren who have passed away during the last year. It is a time of sorrow as we mourn the loss of our Brethren as well as the loss of family, friends, and neighbors, and also think about the difficulties we have had to deal with as a result of the COVID pandemic.

It is natural in times such as these to be more heavily focused on our problems. This is not surprising because we need to pay attention to them, confront them, and try to resolve them. But at the same time, there is another lesson to be learned, and that is we need to spend at least as much time being grateful for what we have as we spend obsessing about what we lack.

There have been a number of books written about the psychological importance of gratitude and how it can increase our feeling of well-being. A key point in most of these books is that emotions affect us mentally and physically, and influence our ability to meet the challenges we face. Stress and negativity drag us down, optimism and positivity build us up.

Without minimizing the seriousness of the issues we face, most of us have much to be thankful for; and, if each day we would make a list of things we are thankful for, and perhaps just focus on one of them, we can generate an attitude shift that will increase both our happiness and resilience so that we can better face our problems.

In this regard, I am reminded of a poem by John O'Donohue which he titled: For Courage.

When the light around you lessens And your thoughts darken until Your body feels fear turn Cold as a stone inside,

When you find yourself bereft Of any belief in yourself And all you unknowingly Leaned on has fallen,

When one voice commands
Your whole heart,
And it is raven dark.

Steady yourself and see That it is your own thinking That darkens your world.

Search and you will find A diamond-thought of light,

Know that you are not alone, And that this darkness has purpose; Gradually it will school your eyes, To find the one gift your life requires Hidden within this night-corner.

> Invoke the learning Of every suffering You have suffered.

Close your eyes.

Simply put, it is at the darkest of times that Masons draw upon the inner light, that spark of the Divine that we seek to nurture throughout our lives as we prepare ourselves for that Celestial Lodge where the Grand Artificer of the Universe resides.

And as the poet notes, "Know that you are not alone." Indeed, when we focus on gratitude we are forced to confront the fact that there are so many in far worse situations than we are. Drawing upon a lesson in the Eighth Degree, Intendent of the Building, we are told: "Compare not thy condition with the few above thee, but to secure thy content, look upon those thousands with whom though wouldst not, for any interest, change thy fortune and condition." Developing a feeling of gratitude for what we have enables us to feel better about ourselves, but also frees us to think about others. It is often said that our grief and pain is often reduced by doing good and helping others.

If, in spite of our troubles, we can maintain a positive attitude, we may be able to find the strength to give a compliment and give encouragement to someone. We will feel better and make someone else feel better as well. I heard a story about a man on his way home who saw a sticker on the wall of the train station that said "hi beautiful, life is great, isn't it!" And every time that person took the train, he'd see the sticker, smile at the compliment, and think of the great time he'd had with his friends. As a result, as he rode home, after a hard day at work, he would be prompted to think of the good things that happened to him that day, and be encouraged to pass on a compliment or a cheery thought to someone else. Rather than feeling sorry for himself, he would feel the personal satisfaction of helping someone else. This is a Masonic approach to life, and I would again cite a lesson from the Eighth Degree: "A Masonic Lodge should resemble a bee-hive, in which all the members work together with ardor for the common good. Masonry is not made for cold souls and narrow minds that do not comprehend its lofty mission and sublime apostolate." Working for the common good, of course, applies to our conduct and actions both within and without the Lodge.

Let me conclude with a story some of you may have heard about angels in Heaven. In one room there were a large number of angels, busy as can be. And in another room there were only a couple of angels who were not very busy at all. The busy angels were answering people's prayers for help, the other angels were there to respond to people who thanked God for their blessings, but they were not busy at all.

So, as I suggested at the beginning of this message, we need to spend at least as much time giving thanks for the blessings we enjoy as we do complaining about what we don't have. By replacing fear with faith, and putting our trust in God, we can push away many of our stresses, wake up every day fresh and strong, more capable of handling the issues and challenges that come our way!

The Sacred Space of the Lodge Room

There are many sacred sites around the world. I could name the Temple Mount in Jerusalem, Lourdes in France, Stonehenge, the Bighorn Medicine Wheel in Wyoming, and many, many more. But I would suggest that, to a Mason, the Lodge room should be considered a sacred place as well.

Before going any further, we need to clarify the difference between "Sacred" and "Holy." While there are similarities between the terms sacred and holy, which are sometimes used interchangeably, there are subtle differences. Holiness is generally the term used in relation to persons and relationships, as in religion. Whereas sacredness is used in relation to objects, places, or happenings. For the purpose of this article, I am referring to the latter in reference to the Lodge.

The word "Lodge" has two meanings to Masons. It is both a place where our meetings are held, and it is also the term for the Brethren. When I was initiated, passed, and raised, my Lodge met in a rented room in a recreation center. In fact, my Lodge was located in four different locations from 1981 to 2007 before we had our own home. Still, throughout that time we were a Lodge. And even though we met in church basements, rec centers, and a daycare center conference room, those places were just as sacred to us as our current Lodge home.

The Lodge is a sacred space set aside for us to meet, conduct ritual, and work together to make us better men. The authors of our Masonic ritual chose to hold Lodge meetings in a place symbolically representing the most sacred place of King Solomon's temple. This was not done by accident, or as a mere addition to a storyline or a narrative. A tiled Lodge is a sacred space and should be reverentially treated as such during every meeting and degree. This does not mean that we cannot have fun, but it is important to remember that time spent in Lodge is not supposed to be ordinary time. It is meant to be sacred time that is set apart from the profane and material world. Just as the men who enter the sacred space are not supposed to be ordinary men, rather, they are initiates who have been set apart from the profane.

Albert Mackey wrote "A Masonic Lodge is therefore to the instructed brethren a symbol of the world... and the world and the universe are made synonymous, when the lodge becomes, of course, a symbol of the universe. But in this case the definition of the symbol is extended, and to the ideas of length and breadth are added those of height and depth, and the lodge is said to assume the form of a double cube. The solid contents of the earth below and the expanse of the heavens above will then give the outlines of the cube, and the whole created universe will be included within the symbolic limits of a Freemason's lodge." (The Symbolism of Freemasonry, the Masonic History Company, Pages 104-105.)

One way in looking at the setting of space in the Lodge room is in viewing the circumambulation. This is done by the Junior Deacon while setting the boundaries of the Great Lights from the rest of the world. It is also done with a Brother escorting the candidate, creating a sacred space from the rest of the world for his initiation. This is related to the sacred circle and its ritual extension. One walks about what is set apart, circumscribed as charged or sacred. Circumambulation is a rite of both centering the meeting and creating a further bonding of those in the room.

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Even the chaplain's prayer is a part of this. Instead of an invocation, the prayer is a request to ask the GAOTU to be with the Brethren for a specific purpose during Lodge, separating the Lodge from the rest of the world as we request divine assistance at the beginning of our communication.

Within our sacred space, using our rituals and practices, we bring men from darkness to light. We make strangers into Brothers. Masters are able to improve their craft. We become more than a social club. The Lodge becomes a sacred endeavor that is truly transformational on the individual and collective level. The purpose of the Lodge must be centered around manifesting and transmitting the sacred light from the GAOTU into the sacred space of the Lodge, where it can be experienced by the Brethren. This experience was essential to illuminating the pathway of our forefathers, and with proper stewardship and intention it will continue to illuminate the pathway of current and future craftsmen.

Wise Master's Message

Jason M. Himsey, KCCH, Wise Master, Alexandria Chapter Rose Croix

Please accept my humble thanks for your trust and confidence in me to serve as Wise Master of the Chapter Rose Croix. I realize the line is progressive, but each of you has a say regarding leadership in our bodies. I will endeavor to serve you and the Valley to my utmost.

I struggled with identifying a topic worthy of your consideration. Then, as I was contemplating the purpose of the article and what the body of the Rose Croix is commissioned to do, it hit me. The charge at my installation as Wise Master was to "Teach the Knights to learn something more than the mere formulas and phrases of the Degree, persuade them to read the history and study the philosophy of Masonry; induce them to seek to learn the meanings of the symbols; show them how, among the mass of Masonic writings, to separate the diamonds from the sands, and endeavor to improve them by your conduct and conversation." That is a tall order, but one that I feel is both important and necessary.

In the spirit of education, my year will be focused on "Inner Reflection, Seek out Your Truth." I believe the 31st Degree, of which I was a member, has many meanings and lessons for us. Particularly, is it enough for us as men and Masons to do the "right thing?" In the 31st Degree there are potentially controversial and complex issues concerning "eternal judgment." As you recall, the ancient Egyptian gods consider the judgment of the soul of Cheris. Do you remember some of the themes or topics in the degree?

- How should a man be judged for deeds committed in the flesh?
- Should judgment be absolute using a consistent standard?
- Is human imperfection a reasonable standard for judgment?
- Should judgment consider our motives in addition to actions?
- Does a "wrong action" done for the "right reason" mitigate an otherwise damning judgment?

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We must consider our human nature. Specifically, in general, we demand that we judge the actions of our fellow man. We must, therefore, realize that judgment is a painful emotional and intellectual evolution. Each day presents a myriad of opportunities to make certain judgments as to the motives, sincerity, and intentions of men. The question remains, how do we do this?

On one hand, we do not have the innate ability to TRULY know what motivates our Brothers to do the things they do; there are so many internal and external factors that contribute to each and every decision made and action executed. In other words, it is simply impossible to understand another's motives with any degree of certainty. However, one of Masonry's fundamental tenets is that "It is the internal and not the external qualifications of a man that Masonry regards!" On the other hand, we are taught that internal motivations for actions should be important to us as Craftsmen.

All human actions have motives. There is no virtuous act, such as charity, which may not be performed for malicious reasons, such as personal gain or control. Equally, a malicious act such as theft may be rooted in virtuous purposes such as feeding one's family.

Who is concerned with the motive for a virtuous or malicious action? Have you been wronged by another? I am certain the answer will be a resounding yes. If so, is it important to you to understand why the person acted the way they did? I know I am very concerned. Why? I consider such elements when charting how I navigate the aftermath. Conversely, if you were helped or received a benefit from other's actions, are you concerned with their reason for helping you?

Who is concerned with motive in general? Moral philosophy as well as most systems of religious faith tender an answer. For example, Christianity teaches, "But when thou doest alms, let not thy left hand know what thy right hand doeth; that thine alms may be in secret: and thy Father which seeth in secret shall recompense thee" (Matthew 6:3-4, RV1895). Here we see that the Father will reward you for what is done in secret. I interpret the thing that is done is one's motive. So, if you have a pure, selfless motive in your actions, the matter is blessed.

Ultimately, motive matters to the Supreme Architect – why I act as I do. And, because it matters to Him, it should matter and be of the utmost importance and concern to me. Accordingly, I consider my own motive in any personal decision to act. I, and I alone, am responsible for my actions and nexus leading to my actions. My behavior is my concern. Yes, I am concerned with the motives of others, but it does not consume me. Furthermore, the eternal consequences of my actions are of the utmost importance to me, therefore, I must rightly divide my motives.

Returning to the lessons of the 31st Degree, the soul of Cheris is judged worthy of eternal life. However, Cheris is only deemed worthy when the gods allow for human frailty and, thereby, agree to consider motives rather than just outcomes – "the internal and not the "external." I have arrived at the conclusion that the solution to the motive question is not in "how" to judge motives, or "why," or even what action to take as a result. Perhaps, instead, the essential thing is to realize "for whom" the effort to judge is important. So, I leave you to consider, is not the right thing, performed with the wrong motive, in essence, the wrong thing? Judgment is a tricky thing! Given our minds are so finite, maybe we should just leave spiritual judgment to the Great Architect of the Universe. And maybe, we should rest in the assurance that judgment on this Plane should be easy if we meet on the Level, act by the Plumb, and part on the Square!

In closing, thank you for joining me this year on our adventures in Masonry, and in the Scottish Rite in particular. I remain your servant.

Bro. Himsey is a retired U.S. Coast Guard surface warfare, law enforcement, and intelligence officer with over 21 years of commissioned and non-commissioned military service. During his five years at sea, LT Bro. Himsey led the charge towards the interdiction of over 7,000 kilograms of cocaine, 2,000+ illegal migrants, and 8.5 million dollars in United States currency - the largest such currency seizure in Coast Guard history at the time. He also navigated 150,000+ nautical miles, coordinated 12 offshore Search and Rescue cases, and led over 200 at-sea boarding.

Bro. Jason currently serves as a Senior Contract Program Manager for Federated IT, Inc. Bro. Himsey earned his Bachelor of Arts with Honors in Criminal Justice with a concentration in Intelligence Studies at American Military University in 2006. He is an alumnus of the Air Force Non-Commissioned Officer Academy, where he was awarded the CMSgt Paul Lankford Commandant's Award for outstanding leadership, the first Coast Guardsman to receive this award.

The January 2022 Alexandria Scottish Rite Awards Dinner

We had a terrific roast beef dinner and great desserts at the January Awards dinner. After presenting our awards to those individuals listed in our January - February Bulletin, we called upon Richard Tirocke to receive the Valley's 2021 Community Service Award Certificate and a check for \$1,500 on behalf of the Masonic Service Association of North America (MSA) Hospital Visitation Program.

Mr. Tirocke, the MSA Hospital Visitation Coordinator, thanked the Valley for its recognition and support of the Hospital Visitation Program which provides personal service and companionship to Masonic and non-Masonic veterans in the various VA hospitals around the country, including the three in Virginia in Richmond, Hampton, and Salem.

He noted many veterans in these facilities are without family or friends and have no one to visit them. To address this problem Masonic volunteers have donated over 750,000 hours to bring comfort to, and raise the morale of, our wounded veterans. These volunteers spend time with these veterans, listening to their stories and concerns, and even holding hands with dying veterans so they are not alone.

Unfortunately, during the pandemic MSA volunteers have not been allowed to visit with the veterans, but they still have been able to provide toiletries such as combs, toothbrushes and toothpaste, chap sticks, nail clippers, and eyeglass cloths. They also have provided comfort items such as pens, notepads, playing cards, puzzle books, stress balls, magnifiers, socks, underwear, and even phone cards so the veterans can stay in touch with friends and loved ones. To fund these efforts volunteers have sought the support of Grand Lodges and appendant bodies, so he was very appreciative of the help that the Alexandria Valley was providing.

Mr. Tirocke also noted that MSA volunteers have helped veterans in other ways as well. They have helped them fill out claim forms, get medical appointments, and drive them to their doctors' offices.

He concluded by saying that there are currently about 175 volunteers in the program covering 172 VA facilities and there is a need for more volunteers. This was even more urgent because many of the volunteers are in their 70s and 80s and will need to be replaced. He urged us to consider becoming a volunteer and suggested we visit MSANA.com for more information.

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April 23 and 30 Spring Reunion

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During the Director of Works Reunion introduction, the class is advised that the teachings of the Scottish Rite are a course of instruction in comparative religion, philosophy, ethics, morality, history, and mythology, all taught through the medium of allegory and symbols. The degrees you are exposed to during a Reunion cover more than 3,000 years of human experience. Even so, there is much more light available: three correspondence courses, a Research Society, dozens of books, monthly magazines, and bimonthly Valley bulletins.

Not every Brother has a deep interest in Masonic philosophy and history. Fortunately, there is much more to the Rite. This includes fellowship, philanthropy, support of our youth, and the opportunity to develop leadership and communications skills.
