

## Wise Master's Message

Mark E. Cummings, Wise Master, Alexandria Chapter of Rose Croix

The Chapter of Rose Croix will perform the Ceremony of Remembrance and Renewal at our March meeting to honor our Brethren who have laid down their working tools and ascended to the Celestial Lodge above. The Ceremony takes place near the vernal equinox, around March 21st, which is a time of new beginnings and the renewal of life on earth. The ceremony is a symbol of man's spiritual, intellectual, and moral rebirth and serves as a reminder of the divine plan of the Great Architect of the Universe. It recognizes the importance of both nature and man as images of God and celebrates the truth that both came from the same divine



plan. It unifies the great religions of man through a common statement of divine purpose and human capability. The ceremony is a celebration of rebirth, freedom, and fraternity and serves as a reminder of the importance of these values in our lives.

With "Remembrance and Renewal" in mind, I've had the opportunity to peruse the meeting minute books of my home Lodge, Olive Branch #114, which was chartered on December 1818, over 200 years ago. This was about 17 years after our Scottish Rite was founded in Charleston, SC in May 1801, and six years before the first Scottish Rite Body was chartered in Virginia at Lynchburg in November 1824. Many Olive Branch Brothers have gone on to the Celestial Lodge since its beginning, just as have many of our Scottish Rite Brothers whom we will focus on at our March ceremony. I would like to share some of the stories of my Brothers that I found in the archives of my Lodge.

With very few exceptions, Olive Branch Lodge has met monthly for well over its 200 years. One of the longest gaps in monthly meetings occurred during the 1861-1865 Civil War. The minutes from the last lodge meeting before the War on April 1, 1861, recorded that Rev. William Wallace Duncan was balloted for and later that evening received the first degree. During the Civil War, Bro. Duncan served as a chaplain in the Confederate Army. He was also a bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church until his death on March 2, 1908.

The subsequent page of the Olive Branch meeting minutes book display the minutes from the May 1865 lodge meeting, the first after the Civil War. The specific date of the meeting was absent, probably an accidental oversight by the Secretary. Although 4 years had passed since the previous meeting, the minutes begin with "The minutes of last meeting read & adopted". The minutes continue, "Labours of this Lodge having been suspended since the regular meeting in April 1861 and according to Resolution of Grand Lodge of Virginia declaring that all Lodges which suspended on account of the troubled condition of the Country, did not forfeit their Charter, and might resume labour without action of Grand Lodge."

A few months later, on October 2, 1865, the Olive Branch meeting minutes documents a visit from the local Civil War hero, Colonel Elijah Viers "Lige" White. Following the opening of a Master Masons Lodge, "Bro E.V. White of Harrisonburg Masonic Lodge No 27 presented his petition for membership in this Lodge. On motion the By-Laws were suspended and Bro White duly elected a member. Lodge duly closed." Col Elijah White was commander of the partisan 35th Battalion of Virginia Cavalry during the American Civil War. His men were known as "White's Comanches" for their war cries and sudden raids on enemy targets. Brother White was born in Poolesville Maryland in 1832 and died in Leesburg at age 74, in 1907. He is buried in Leesburg's Union Cemetery. *(Continued on Page 2.)*

Although I never met these Olive Branch Lodge Brothers from the Civil War era, I feel I know their character. They performed admirably, meeting two-or-three-or-four times a month, performing two or three degrees a month, helping candidates become brothers, and promoting brothers through the degrees of Masonry.

We don't have to focus on historically significant Masons, in our Ceremony of Remembrance and Renewal. Each year we remember the far-too-many Brothers we lost in just the past year, and remember the many contributions they made to our Lodges, Valley and community. We know our friendships and memories are everlasting, but our earthly days with each other are numbered. We must make the best of each day. I look forward to seeing all of you at the Ceremony of Remembrance and Renewal on Friday, March 10.



Wise Master's BIO

Brother Cummings was born and raised in El Cajon, California. In 1976, he moved to Colorado to attend the US Air Force Academy. He was captain of the Track & Field team and broke the USAFA school record in the metric mile. Upon graduating with a Chemistry degree in 1980, Mark earned his wings at Williams AFB in Arizona. He spent the next decade flying the F-15 Eagle at various locations, such as Kadena AB, Okinawa; Holloman AFB, New Mexico; Nellis AFB, Las Vegas; Soesterberg AB, the Netherlands; Langley AFB, Virginia; and New Orleans, Louisiana.

While in New Orleans, Brother Cummings met his wife, Melanie. They were married in 1997 and their daughter Mici was born in 1999. During this timeframe, Mark became a cyber security professional. In 2010, the family moved to Leesburg, Virginia for a strategy job with USAF Checkmate at the Pentagon, where he served as Deputy Director for 10 years. Currently, Mark works as a program manager for Air Force Acquisitions, primarily involved with the export of the F-35 Lightning II.

In 2013, Brother Mark became a Mason at Olive Branch Lodge in Leesburg, Virginia where he later served as Worshipful Master in 2019. He joined the Scottish Rite at Alexandria Valley's Spring 2014 Reunion, immediately joining the 14<sup>th</sup> Degree cast. Over the years, he has participated in the 9<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup>, 12<sup>th</sup>, 14<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup> degrees. Brother Cummings holds memberships in Olive Branch Lodge #114, Potomac Royal Arch Chapter #88, Piedmont Commandery of Knights Templar #26, Alexandria Scottish Rite Valley, and Kena Shrine Temple.

Outside of the Craft, Brother Cummings enjoys spending time with his family. His wife Melanie is a program manager for a software development firm, and their daughter Mici, a graduate of University of Virginia, is an Aerospace Engineer at Northrop Grumman. He also enjoys the great outdoors, especially hunting the majestic and elusive Rocky Mountain Elk.

#### *Leadership is an Opportunity, Not Just a Responsibility* Ill. Norman L. Hoff, Jr., 33°, Assistant Personal Representative

Many think of "leadership" in the context of a role or position of authority - for example "the leadership" of an organization. This is sometimes manifested in an organizational chart showing the lines of accountability for a program or product from the "number one" person, progressing through the group... identifying who responds to whom to achieve a product or desired conclusion. While leadership defined by a personnel "org-chart" might help in understanding organizational structure and levels of authority, this alone provides little to deliver a specific result.



In a more focused context, leadership usually refers to that ability of one person or a team of persons to plan, assemble resources, organize, train and, finally, persuade a group of others to engage in a coordinated effort to achieve a particular task. There is a specific leadership skill set that allows one to motivate a desire in others to move in a particular direction, and to instill in others the energy necessary to achieve a desired objective or goal.

While there are many "effective leadership concepts" designed to increase the probability of successfully reaching a goal, these concepts all seem to include some combination of basic components: *definition* of a clearly defined objective; *analysis* of the critical path to achieving the objective; *training* to provide participants with the required tools and skills to negotiate that critical path; and *communication* with and among the participants to track progress, identify issues and remedy shortfalls. Critical to this leadership concept is the awareness of the importance of personal interaction at each node: *defining, analyzing, training,* and *communicating…* to whom? These are interpersonal skills rather than technical or even intellectually creative abilities.

In January, Alexandria Valley installed our 2023 Officers to lead us for the coming year. This annual transition is a valuable part of our Valley experience in that we receive the benefit of new leaders with fresh ideas and approaches to accomplish significant undertakings. It is important that every member of our Valley understands the process by which these Brothers have prepared themselves to meet their many leadership responsibilities.

One of the significant benefits of our Scottish Rite experience, is the opportunity offered to all our members to develop leadership skills that not only contribute to the successful operations of our Valley, but to their own life experience and employment success. *(Continued on Page 4.)*



## **Empathy**

*Psychology Today* defines EMPATHY as the ability to recognize, understand, and share the thoughts and feelings of another person, animal, or fictional character. Developing empathy is crucial for establishing relationships and behaving compassionately. It involves experiencing another person's point of view, rather than just one's own, and enables prosocial or helping behaviors that comes from **within**, ---internal, rather than external, as we are taught in Lodge---not forced or contrived. Freemasonry is inherently empathetic, by virtue of our very teachings, which foster Brotherly Love, Relief, and Truth---the "Golden Rule", and the conciliation of *true friendship among those who might otherwise remain at a perpetual* distance---empathy helps us cooperate with others, build lifelong friendships, make moral decisions, and intervene when we see others being bullied or mistreated.

In *The Voice of Freemasonry, Issue 2, 2019,* MW Charbel T. Fahad, of the Grand Lodge of the District of Columbia, speaks of Empathy in his Message with several *allusions* of profound Masonic significance to all of us, as he says: Trees are used to symbolize empathy for multiple reasons. First, they provide shade from the oppressive summer heat. In Sonnet 12, for instance, Shakespeare speaks of how in summer "lofty trees... from heat did canopy the herd," or in other words, providing protection with shade.

There is also George Pope Morris' 1837 poem (and later popular song) "Woodman Spare That Tree," in which the poet writes of how "in youth it sheltered me... that old familiar tree." The aged oak of this latter poem furnishes a vehicle for empathy both by way of the shade it provides, as well as the comfort of familiarity— for trees also can serve as living landmarks, both personal and public. Finally, in his Handbook for German Freemasons, Hermann H. Gerdes explores the meaning of the *Yggdrasil* tree found throughout Scandinavian lore. This sacred and holy tree's branches "rise to the highest heavens and its roots reach down to the nether-most regions of the eternal darkness of earth. Its branches grow from generation to generation, bestowing blessings, life, and beauty to Humanity." Gerdes suggests that, like the Yggdrasil, empathy and moral conviction come from knowing Freemasonry has been passed down through the ages, rooted in the stability and continuity of eternal truths revealed by the Grand Architect of the Universe...from "time immemorial."

Recent local and global events have devastated our sense of normalcy, of how good and decent people "should" act in the face of tragedy, hate, and indifference. Of course it is easy to simply allocate to our consciousness to a term known as *psychic numbing,* a concept created by University of Oregon psychologist Paul Slovic....it describes how tragedies turn into abstractions in our minds, and how abstractions are easily attenuated and even ignored. We all begin to sense a feeling of helplessness; we feel more and more powerless to help, so we consequently shut down those feelings of EMPATHY that we KNOW darned well we should inculcate!

As Masons, we must unfailingly strive daily to "walk in someone else's shoes", to "see how it feels", and to realize that WE, as members of the world's greatest Fraternal society, have within us, if we so choose---and are "Obligated to"---to promote EMPATHY in our daily *transactions with mankind*!
