

Our Scottish Rite Reunions are so named because they are a welcomed opportunity for our widely dispersed membership to reunite and share our degrees with those brothers seeking to join our Rite. The degrees are not just for those who are receiving them for the first time. As participants in the degree conferrals, we commit our time either to refresh the roles we have performed many times in the past, or to learn new roles to increase our understanding of the lessons of the degrees. As students desirous of further understanding of our Rite, we attend the Reunions to increase our knowledge...and with time, perhaps even to gain increased wisdom.



We repeatedly hear Brothers say, "Every time I attend a Reunion, or participate in a degree, I realize some new point or interpretation, that had not occurred to me before." Knowledge can be increased through memorization, but wisdom requires understanding.

In addition to being an enjoyable fraternal event and educational refresher on the lessons of our degrees, the Reunions also create new 32° Masters of the Royal Secret. We warmly welcome and encourage them to become active participants in our Valley activities. We eagerly look forward to receiving those who will be joining us at our next Reunion on October 22 and 29, 2022, and to assisting them on their journey in the Scottish Rite.

Our Reunions are made possible by many Brothers who provide the essential "behind-the-scenes" functions, such as stage crews, wardrobe, sound and lighting, projection, and prompters as well as administrative and meal support functions. Many prefer these roles, but the more visible parts of the Reunion are the on-stage degree conferrals and the classroom communications. Our recently completed dramatic conferrals employed 90 Brothers in 162 cast roles, plus nine more communicating the remaining degrees. New members might assume, "All the cast roles are already taken by others," but obviously there are many more roles than current participants. Additionally, many Degree Masters pursue "bench depth" with multiple Brothers who can assume various roles in the Degrees' casts — this not only permits additional opportunity to learn the lessons of the Degrees, but also provides qualified team members to step in when another member is unable to be present due to work, family or health issues. As we study our roles and prepare for the conferrals and communications, we become more effective Soldiers of the Light.

We encourage all members who are not already participating in the degrees to contact our Director of Work or one of the Degree Masters listed on the <u>Help Wanted</u> file on the home page of our Valley website at <u>alexandriascottishrite.org</u>. The file also identifies non-speaking and relatively brief cast roles that may be perfect for those just beginning as a cast member.

We look forward to each of you getting involved in the work of your Valley and continuing your Masonic education by participating in our Scottish Rite Reunions.

Working tools of the Entered Apprentice

As I pondered what article to write about in Freemasonry, I thought to myself what got me into Freemasonry from the beginning and it's something we all learn early on in our journey as Freemasons. In the Entered Apprentice degree, we are asked to take our first step in Freemasonry to be better men, exceptional neighbors in our communities, upstanding citizens in our government, and to give more to those who are in greater need than we.

As I started thinking about that first step and every step after as I became a Master Mason, I kept going back to those first teachings as an Entered Apprentice and what it meant to me on a personal level and how we can all too often lose sight of what matters most, the precious time we all have on this earth and how we can utilize it to become better men, husbands, fathers, and members of society, but all too often we find ourselves lost in time and trying to find more of it in our daily lives.

Which brings me to the working tools of an Entered Apprentice, which are the 24-inch gauge and common gavel. We are taught to utilize these tools as instruments in our lives and in our Masonic journey, but do we truly know the symbolism behind these working tools beyond what we were told that fateful night in lodge. The 24-inch gauge being an instrument used to measure our time throughout the day to include our service to God and the relief of a distressed worthy brother, and the common gavel with which we are taught to improve ourselves as living stones for that spiritual building.

While the 24-inch gauge can be divided into three equal parts, we are to divide our time in the day to ensure we properly manage our time, to make necessary time blocks to accomplish our goals we set out for our day and not be overwhelmed with all the stresses of work, family life, and our Masonic life. We all have felt that stress but if we take a lesson from the 24-inch gauge and measure out our day and plan accordingly we can all meet those goals and ensure we still find time for the service of God, our work, both Masonic and our jobs, and refreshment and sleep.

As for the common gavel, it is used to assist us in getting rid of all the vices and superfluities of life thus leaving us as those living stones for our spiritual building in which we will live in once we reach our final Masonic resting spot in heaven. We are reminded by the rough and perfect Ashlars that nothing comes without hard work and determination and that throughout our several stages in life we strive to use that common gavel towards making us better men. At no point are we truly perfect Ashlars. While we all have work that needs to be done in our daily lives, we always have opportunities to improve ourselves beyond what we were yesterday but not as great as our future image may be.

So, as we go forth throughout our life let us not forget who we were before becoming Freemasons, who we were as Entered Apprentices, and how we can become better men as Master Masons. Become that student who learns from those who have held the working tools of Freemasonry longer than we have. Use these tools to become teachers for those just joining Freemasonry, for the student becomes the teacher as we become better men and Master Masons. Our journey will continue; even after we enter the eternal heavens, what we leave behind will be learning lessons for generations to come.

In becoming a 32° Scottish Rite mason we are taught to expand upon becoming a "True Soldier" to our God, our community, our brethren, and ourselves. We look towards making great men even greater and encourage ourselves to be self-reliant and independent. Our service is expanded through our charitable work and our communities, not only the ones we live in but also that community of our appendant body which allows for a broader group of mentors and mentees as we seek further light in Masonry.

Always focus on all the working tools more especially those we first started with, as they are the foundational building tools we use in our daily lives. Also, be sure to mark your calendars with those important dates and reminders, so we don't become overwhelmed.

Feast of Tishri Jason M. Himsey, KCCH, Wise Master, Alexandria Chapter of Rose Croix

The Valley will observe the Feast of Tishri at our pre-meeting dinner in September. This annual Scottish Rite event celebrates the completion and dedication of King Solomon's Temple. It is also the Hebrew equivalent of Thanksgiving or Harvest festival. It is necessary to have understanding of some Jewish Holy Days to understand the significance of the Feast of Tishri and its connection to Freemasonry.

In Leviticus, the Lord spoke to Moses, "Howbeit on the fifteenth day of the seventh month, when ye have gathered in the fruits of the land, ye shall keep the feast of the LORD seven days... And ye shall take you on the first day the fruit of goodly trees [citron], branches of palm trees, and boughs of thick trees [myrtle], and willows of the brook; and ye shall rejoice before the LORD your God seven days. And ye shall keep it a feast unto the LORD seven days in the year: it is a statute for ever in your generations: ye shall keep it in the seventh month. Ye shall dwell in booths seven days; all that are homeborn in Israel shall dwell in booths... when I brought them out of the land of Egypt: I am the LORD your God." (Leviticus 23:39-43 RV1895)

Tishri is a month occurring in September or October of the Gregorian calendar. According to the Tanakh, or Hebrew Bible, before the Babylonian Exile, it was known as the seventh month of the ecclesiastical calendar. It was called Ethanim, which means "endurance" and references the brooks and streams flowing at this time of year. The word Ethanim is based on the root word "ethan," which means, "strength."

The current name of the month, Tishri, is Babylonian. The Babylonians took the Jews into captivity over a period of 50-60 years after the First Temple was destroyed by the Babylonians in 587 BC. Henceforth, the Jews have used the Babylonian name of the month, Tishri, to refer to the beginning of their civil year. The two names of this month, Ethanim, the seventh ecclesiastical month, and Tishri, the first civil month, may be taken as references to the principles of strength and establishment. These two principles are referenced by the Hebrew names of the two bronze pillars that were at the portico of the Temple, Boaz for strength and Jachin for establishment. (1 King's 7:21)

There are some key points throughout the Bible that hold significance to Masons. First, the Temple is not a place that contains God. Solomon declares that nothing, not even the highest heavens can contain God. Rather, he prays for the Temple to be a dwelling place for God's presence, a place to communicate with God. As a dwelling place for Shekinah, God's presence, the Temple was more than just a place to offer praise and prayers. The Temple also housed the Ark Covenant, which contained the Tablets of the Law communicated by God to Moses and was the foundation of the Mercy Seat on top of the Ark where Shekinah, also known as the "glory of the Lord," would manifest in smoke and flame. So, in addition to being a place for the communication of praise and prayer, the Temple was a place of communion with God. King Solomon promised to always have a presence in the Temple, and to bestow blessings of justice, prosperity, and peace, so long as the people of Israel continued following God's laws. He further declared that God's name, eyes, ears, and heart would be in the Temple, open not only to the people of Israel, but to foreigners as well.

The last point in the preceding paragraph discussing foreigners is of particular importance to Freemasons. Freemasonry pays careful attention to the fact that the building of the Temple was not accomplished by King Solomon and the Israelites alone. The Bible tells us the Phoenician King Hiram of Tyre, his architect, Hiram Abif, and a great number of his workmen were essential to the building of the Temple. Masonic tradition also teaches that King Hiram of Tyre provided much of the financial and material resources for the Temple's construction. In short, King Solomon's Temple could not have been built without the foreigners. Think on this…the Temple, dedicated to God, who is therein worshipped through Jewish names and religious customs, owed its existence to non-Jews.

Feast of Tishri

This observation is of utmost Masonic significance because it is reflected in our own commitment to welcome men of all faiths who acknowledge a Supreme Being and are willing to take our moral and fraternal obligations. That's how Christians, Jews, Muslims, Buddhists, Hindus, and others can sit side by side, bow their heads in reverence together, pray together, and together dedicate their work to Deity, even though their hearts may be silently speaking different names for Deity.

Masonic initiation and instruction offer each of us the opportunity to take our bodies and soul and mold them to be a more complete and refined temple for God's presence in this world. And, just as with King Solomon's Temple, it's important to understand that in order accomplish this, we need the help of others. Masonry not only offers us the opportunity, but actually expects us to both give and accept help from our Brothers who often have very different experiences.

In closing, we can see that the Feast of Tishri holds a special place in Scottish Rite Masonry not just because it commemorates the completion and dedication of King Solomon's Temple, but because that event is symbolic of things each of us should be doing in our own lives. The rich legend of the Temple's dedication, held in connection with the Feast of Tishri, furnish symbolic details of the Temple's position, design, construction, furnishings, and decoration carry special meaning as they apply to the metaphorical Temple of Freemasonry built in the heart of every Brother. When King Solomon dedicated the first Temple, he was not dedicating a mere structure, he was praying for all mankind. Through the symbols of the Temple we learn to rededicate ourselves to building Freemasonry in the hearts of men. We can and should give thanks to the Great Architect of the Universe for our many blessings: home, family, friends and for our Country.

He has a background in Adapted PE which uniquely qualifies him to address needs of all students especially those operating with a disability. Dave has an effervescent personality which makes him a highly effective teacher.

Her high school provides a much needed second chance to children who would otherwise be left behind. She teaches Economics and Personal Finance. With her background she mentored a group of young people in an investment exercise and her group came in first.

The teacher award program provides a tangible benefit to those serving our community. The Alexandria Valley of the Scottish Rite has developed a terrific program to honor our teachers. Brotherly Love

Embedded within the Tenets of our Masonic Profession rests "Brotherly Love", exemplified in our Entered Apprentice's Lecture, wherein we hear, "Freemasonry unites men of every country, sect, and opinion...and conciliates true friendship among those who might otherwise remain at a perpetual distance." What a beautiful admonition to our Craft. In the first decade of the 20th century, a related writing is found of "THE ROBBER AND THE SPIDER":

The selfishness and disregard for the welfare of others that we find in the world today brings to mind the Japanese fable of the robber and the spider. The robber had been sent to the infernal regions. One day the Lord Buddha paid a visit to the gloomy underworld and the robber cried out to be returned to the world of light. When questioned by Buddha as to the kind deeds he had performed while on earth, he could think of only one. Once, instead of crushing with his foot a spider in his path, he lifted the spider to the side of the road, where it would be safe from the feet of others.

Buddha responded not. He merely smiled and went his way, but soon the robber saw before him a thread of finest silk glittering in the darkness. It was a thread of spider's silk leading upward. To his astonishment the robber found the silk strong enough to bear his weight, so hand over hand he climbed upward. As he was nearing the light, he heard below him the voices of many others who were climbing the apparently frail spider's thread. Fearing that all the weight would break the thin, trembling silk, the robber called angrily to those below, "Get off, get back, this thread belongs to me!" The words had scarcely been spoken when the thread snapped and the robber fell to the gloomy depths from which he had so nearly escaped.

The robber of the fable has many human imitators. Every day we see cases of those who have given all their efforts to acquiring material things for themselves without thought for others. The physical body cannot stand the effort and the silken cord snaps. On the other hand, we see others who have no ambition to have more than enough to provide for their own comfort, but who get much out of life because of their regard for the welfare and happiness of others.

Interest in others is not demonstrated by contributions of material things, **but** rather by forgetting material things long enough to show a keen interest in what *others are endeavoring to accomplish*. By forgetting material things long enough to have time to have time to mingle with friends. By forgetting material things long enough to take a smile into a sick room. By forgetting the race for material possessions long enough to have time to **sympathize with the misfortunes of others**, and by taking time we might otherwise employ to our own profit to show others how they may follow in the way where we have succeeded.

After all, should any man wish to be the only one to reach a goal? He'd be very lonesome, indeed.... As Masons, we **must** focus, as we are taught, on that CHARITY inculcated daily in our lives. Do good unto ALL, every day, when no one is looking.

As we read in the early 1700s Proceedings of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania, "Charity is a universal characteristic of Masonry." It has been said that "the Masonic Way is to give without remembering and to receive without forgetting."

It gives a great impression when new candidates look over and see occupied seats. If Brothers who are in degrees can get in to the habit of showing up early and/or staying late so that they can sit in the audience for at least one degree, it will help fill out the audience and go a long way toward making the candidates feel that they are joining a healthy and vibrant Valley, and I believe it will make them more likely to patriciate themselves.

All of these are necessary to the continued success of our Reunions and those that are not already participating need to help those who are and find some way to get involved. I truly believe that participation is a rewarding experience and those who are not participating are really missing out on the camaraderie and fellowship that are one of greatest benefits of being a Scottish Rite Mason.
