What is Freemasonry Worth?

When I think of all the places I could have been born and all of the countries in which I could have been living, I am so grateful to be an American. I do not want for food. I have clean drinking water, a comfortable place to live, and sufficient money for my needs – and many of my wants. There are Brethren who are isolated with health issues who need, at a minimum, encouragement and moral support. There are neighbors who are having economic difficulties who can use some help – and just a few dollars, that each of us would hardly miss, can really make a difference in their lives.

I came across a quote from a famous pastry chef, Dieter Schorner, recently deceased, that is relevant to Freemasonry. He said, "If you want one year of prosperity, grow grain, if you want 10 years of prosperity, grow trees. But if you want 100 years of prosperity grow people." This is what Freemasonry is all about, and we need to be more aggressive in getting our message out about all the good that Freemasonry has done and is doing. There are many men, young and not so young, who share our values and would benefit from membership – and we need to let them know more about our Fraternity. It is not our so-called secrets but rather our philosophy and values, what we do and what we stand for, that will encourage these men to petition. Attracting these men to the Fraternity will be a service to them, will work toward the betterment of our community, and will be important to the future of our great Fraternity.

Albert Pike's Interpretation of the Square and Compasses

The Square and Compasses are likely the two most recognized symbols associated with Freemasons around the world. The Square and Compasses ornament Masonic Lodges and can be found on public buildings, including some that have never been Lodges. Many of us proudly display the symbols on rings, shirts, hats, and even our cars. Brothers, over many generations, have chosen to have them inscribed on their tombstones so that anyone who walks past that grave will know that this man was a Freemason. As new Masons, we first learn about the significance of the Square and Compasses in our catechism, as they, along with the Holy Bible, represent the three great lights. As a catechism coach for my Blue Lodge, I go through these explanations time and time again. The new Brother learns that the Square symbolizes virtue while the Compasses are to remind him to keep his passions within due bounds. Recently, however I was reading some of the works of Albert Pike, particularly *Esoterika: The Symbolism of the Blue Degrees of Freemasonry*, where I found that Pike's interpretation of the Square and Compasses differs from that which we learn about in our catechism.

The traditional explanation in many Masonic texts and generally agreed on by Masonic scholars is that the Square and Compasses has its origins in the stonemason's guilds in the Middle Ages.¹ In his *Lexicon of Freemasonry*, Albert Mackey explains that "by the square, a stone is tried and proved. To the speculative, the square applies to the principles of morality; each action of human life is judged, and approved or condemned." As related in the ritual, Mackey also says that a Freemason is to square his actions by the Square of Virtue, which inculcates lessons of morality, truthfulness, and honesty while using the Compasses to circumscribe his desires and keep his passions within due bounds.^{3,4} Certainly, these are important lessons for Freemasons to live by, as we should exemplify morality and virtue, as well as keep our emotions and actions measured.

Pike's research however, provides a somewhat different explanation of the Square and Compasses. Essentially, Pike believes that the Square and Compasses symbolize man's state as an eternal soul manifesting in a temporary body. Pike came to this conclusion while studying hermetic texts such as *Azoth*, published in 1613 by Basilius Valentinus. In *Azoth*, Pike focuses on a particular illustration called the Rebis, which is rich with deep symbolism, among which is a human body with the head of both a man and woman. Pike found that the two headed body represents the dual nature of humans which are part animal and material as well as part intellectual and spiritual. Essentially, a human is differentiated by other animals with the gift of a soul. The female side of the figure is holding the square, a tool that is applied to level surfaces and rectilinear angles. Because the ground we walk on is basically level and anciently believed to be flat, the Square represents the Earth. The male side of the figure is holding the Compasses, which is used to create circles and deals with spherical trigonometry, represents the sky or Heaven.

Because the square is an emblem which represents the earth and the body, its two points represent animal appetites and passion. The compasses, or the emblem of the spiritual soul also has two points which represent morality and reason. Therefore, to pass from the square to the compasses means to gain control over one's animal passions into what makes us human: morality and reason. This concept should be familiar to most Freemasons. As we progress through each of the three degrees, we gain greater knowledge and mastery over our animal instincts and smooth out the rough ashlar and come closer to Deity.

Pike believed that the Square and Compasses were more ancient than middle age stonemasons, which, as mentioned previously, were used in the hermitic texts published a least 100 years prior to the Grand Lodge of England. Pike further points out that the hermetic texts came from philosophical teachings established years prior to the 1613 publication of *Azoth*, making the symbols even older. Hermeticism itself is a philosophical system based on Greek and Egyptian teachings dating from 300 B.C.E. to 1200 C.E.⁷ The Square and Compasses also were used in Confucius philosophy, most notably that of Mencius who lived in 371-289 B.C.E.

While making many references to the tools, Mencius tells us "The Master Mason in teaching his apprentices, makes use of the Square and the Compasses. Ye who are engaged in the pursuit of wisdom must also make use of the Square and the Compasses." This is not to say that the origin of Freemasonry is thousands of years old, but instead Pike was likely correct in believing that the use of the Square and Compasses as moral symbols predates the Middle Ages.

This is not to say that the conclusion that Mackey and others have taught are incorrect. In fact, Mackey dives further into many symbols in other works that is very interesting and worthy of every Freemason's consideration. Pike simply sought a deeper meaning to the symbolism of the Square and Compasses and did not rely solely on the belief that stonemasons alone came up with descriptions of how their working tools could relate to their spiritual lives. The ritual in the symbolic Lodge can easily lend itself to both explanations. It seems that within Freemasonry, there are multiple levels to the symbolism, and it is incumbent on each of us to seek out further light and share that light with our Brethren. The research Pike has done should better enable us to apply the hidden lesson of the Square and Compasses to our everyday lives; allowing us to smooth out the edges to our rough ashlars.



The Scottish Rite Conference

After being sequestered for so long because of the pandemic, it was especially good to be back in person in Roanoke with our Scottish Rite Brethren from around the Commonwealth. There were 210 Brethren and wives in attendance - 44 from our Valley. We had good speakers to include our Grand Master MW and III. Douglas Vernon Jones; the Sovereign Grand Commander, III. and MW Jim Cole; our SGIG III. and MW Alan Adkins, and III. Mark Tabbert, the Director at the George Washington Memorial who is also a historian of note. In addition, III. and MW Kerry Campbell, Bro. Maurice Fisher, Pd.D. from the Valley of Roanoke, and III. Sam Welty from the Valley of Norfolk gave interesting presentations.

A high point of the Conference was a video presentation and talk from the Director of Radford University's speech program thanking the Scottish Rite of Virginia for contributing over a million dollars to the program, enabling it to help thousands of children and train so many speech pathologists. We also heard from a young lady and her mother, who movingly recounted how their lives had been turned around as a result of the help we provided the University.
